



First edition, offprint version, after the extremely rare privately printed version from 1822. This copy is the first separate printing of the British government's reprint of Babbage's 1822 letter to Sir Humphry Davy which also appears in Vol 15 of *The House of Commons Sessional Papers*, paginated 9-16. This separate printing also includes for the first time copies of accompanying letters from the Treasury and the Royal Society.

Babbage's letter to Sir Humphry Davy upon the completion of his experimental difference engine led the great man to recommend the project to the government for funding. Consequently, in 1823 Babbage was granted £1500 from the Civil Contingency Fund to build the full scale Difference Engine No. 1. 'Babbage had Clement assemble a small section of the engine as a demonstration piece. The assembly, which worked impeccably, represented about one-seventh of the whole machine and was ready toward the end of 1832. This section of Difference Engine no. 1, transferred to the Science Museum, London, in 1862, is the first known automatic calculator and ranks among the most celebrated icons in the prehistory of computing.' (ODNB).





Second edition, eighth impression. **Copies in the original wrappers are extremely rare**. "This represents the only section of Darwin's big book on the origin of species which was printed in his lifetime and corresponds to its first two intended chapters" (Freeman, p. 122).. The theory of Pangenesis, currently discussed as the inheritance of acquired characteristics, is here expounded by Darwin for the first time. Other chapters consider "the amount and nature of the changes which animals or plants have undergone whilst under man's dominion", employing observations of inheritance within a species in an effort to understand the causes of variability. This is one of Darwin's most influential and wideranging books. It is also his longest and most detailed work.




First edition, unnumbered copy from a limited edition of 485. The standard and most comprehensive work on the dodo of Mauritius and the Solitaires of Réunion and Rodriguez. The nephew of the last shogun, Hachisuka was a Japanese aristocrat whose passion for ornithology was nurtured during his studies at Selwyn College Cambridge. He made a number of important ornithological expeditions to Iceland, North Africa and the Congo. He died in 1953 and this essential work was published posthumously.





It goes without saying that this is one of the great classics of twentieth century science writing and remains the greatest public monument to Hawking's phenomenal mind.

First edition. This work features beautiful plates produced through a process known as xylography. This process was the particular speciality of A.F. Lydon who went on to illustrate William Greene's *Parrots in Captivity* and David Wooster's *Alpine Plants*, amongst others. This work could not have been more generously produced, with its lavish backgrounds to the river banks, and the substantial and detailed illustrations.




First and only edition, in a variant binding unnoted by Freeman. Henslow was an important figure in Darwin's life. He was Darwin's mentor at Cambridge and was entrusted with the material from the *Beagle* when it reached England. Darwin's *Letters on geology* were written from the *Beagle* to Henslow. In fact, Darwin's place on the voyage was due to the fact that both Henslow and Jenyns turned down the opportunity. Henslow recommended to Fitzroy that his young naturalist friend should take the position instead. Darwin's deep connection with the man is the reason why Jenyns invited him to write a personal recollection of Henslow, which appears here on pages 51-55 and which was not reprinted in full until Nora Barlow's *Darwin and Henslow* in 1967.


This is a very scarce work, with only a couple of copies appearing at auction. It never went to a second edition, and the fact that it sold sporadically is suggested by the existence of several variant bindings. Yet this is a wonderful example of Darwin writing in a personal vein and giving thanks for a man to whom he owed so much. Something here is revealed of Darwin's own moral code: "Reflecting over his character with gratitude and reverence, his moral attributes rise, as they should do in the highest character, in pre-eminence over his intellect".

Henslow (1796-1861) was a renowned naturalist in his own right. He founded the Cambridge University Botanic Garden in 1831, which he developed into a world class site, and published a number of useful botanical books including *A Catalogue of British Plants* (1829). This book was the product of a herbarium of British flora that he organised with fellow collectors such as W.J. Hooker and J.H. Balfour. In cataloguing the plants he noted varations within species, and his thoughts on these variations influenced Darwin's later theories. He married Jenyn's sister Harriet in 1823 and their eldest daughter Frances married Hooker's eminent son, Joseph Dalton Hooker, one of Darwin's closest friends.



Second edition, greatly enlarged, of the first French book on microscopy (1st ed.: 1718 with the title Descriptions and only 34 plates). Joblot (1645-1723), professor of mathematics at the Ecole nationale des Beaux-Arts, probably became interested in microscopy during the visit of Huygens and Hartsoeker to Paris in 1678 when they demonstrated microscopes brought from Holland. While Joblot's observations were largely limited to protozoa in the first edition, the second edition reflects his study of minerals, plant cross-sections, and insects, illustrated on the plates in the first volume. Joblot "introduced some improvements, including the use of stops (diaphragms) in compound microscopes to correct for chromatic aberration. Joblot designed the first porte loupe, a simple preparation microscope in which the lens is supported by a string of 'Musschenbroek nuts,' forming a ball-and-socket jointed arm."—D.S.B., VII, p. 110





Second, revised edition. Scarce, especially in original cloth. This is one of the most influential books of nineteenth century physics. "Maxwell once remarked that the aim of his Treatise was not to expound the final view of his electromagnetic theory, which he had developed in a series of five major papers between 1855 and 1868; rather, it was to educate himself by presenting a view of the stage he had reached in his thinking. Accordingly, the work is loosely organized on historical and experimental, rather than systematically deductive lines. It extended Maxwell's ideas beyond the scope of his earlier work in many directions, producing a highly fecund (if somewhat confusing) demonstration of the special importance of electricity to physics as a whole. He began the investigation of moving frames of reference, which in Einstein's hands were to revolutionize physics; gave proofs of the existence of electromagnetic waves that paved the way for Hertz's discovery of radio waves; worked out connections between the electrical and optical qualities of bodies that would lead to modern solid-state physics; and applied Tait's quaternion formulae to the field equations, out of which Heaviside and Gibbs would develop vector analysis" (Norman).


The *Treatise* first appeared in 1873, and Maxwell then revised the first nine chapters, which were with the printers, in preparation for a second edition at the time of his death in 1879. As Niven explains in his preface: "Those who are familiar with the first edition will see from a comparison with the present how extensive were the changes intended by Professor Maxwell both in substance and in treatment of the subject [...] The first nine chapters were in some cases entirely rewritten, much new matter being added and the former contents rearranged and simplified" (p. xv). The remainder of the text was lightly revised by Niven, with assistance from his brother Charles Niven and J.J. Thomson, who edited the third edition of 1893.







The first edition of 1974 ran to 875 copies; this edition, which includes black and white photos for the first time, was of 8000 copies and was one of the last before the book was taken on by a 'real' publisher (a development that obviously caused Emery some heartache, as she writes in the newsletter included here. She feared she was selling out). The book is a veritable bible of organic living, cooking and gardening. "Carla Emery is certifiably one of the craziest, warmest, ... funniest, wisest, most lovable, and idealistic zanies now walking the earth." — Mother Earth News









She was granted special access to the gardens due to her position in London society and so was able to mix historical description with personal reaction in her text.



First edition in book form, originally appearing in monthly parts.. George Nicholson (1847 - 1908) was the Curator of the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew and the *Illustrated Dictionary*, which was to extend to twelve volumes in later editions, was his major opus, becoming a standard work by the end of the nineteenth century. It was celebrated not only for its thorough and authoritative text, but also for its attractive binding and lavish illustration.



It is also extremely practical and full of tips that are of help in our own time of oil price hikes and fuel poverty.

Vita Sackville-West wrote a weekly column called "In Your Garden" in the *Observer* from 1947 to 1961. *In Your Garden* (1951) begins the anthological collection of garden essays taken from that column. *In Your Garden Again* (1953) continues the format of essays grouped by month offering practical suggestions on matters of taste and plant selection, based on her personal experience gardening at Sissinghurst Castle. As before Sackville West provides an index of the plants about which she writes. The series continues with *More for Your Garden* (1955) and ends with *Even More for Your Garden* (1958). It is very rare to find all four first editions together with their dustjackets.

In this work, which complements On the Origin of Species, Darwin expounded fully his theory of sexual selection and discussed at length the link he recognised between human and ape lineage: 'In the Origin Darwin had avoided discussing the place occupied by Homo sapiens in the scheme of natural selection, stating only that "light will be thrown on the origin of man and his history." Twelve years later he made good his promise with The descent of man, in which he compared man's physical and psychological characteristics to similar traits in apes and other animals, showing how even man's mind and moral sense could have developed through evolutionary processes. In discussing man's ancestry Darwin did not claim that man was directly descended from apes as we know them today, but stated simply that the extinct ancestors of Homo sapiens would have to be classified among the primates; however, this statement, as misinterpreted by the popular press, caused a furor second only to that raised by the Origin' (Norman, p. 218). This book further enhanced Darwin's fame, if not his popularity, and is one of the most significant works in the evolutionary canon. The second edition, which first appeared in 1874, was 'extensively revised and contains a note of the brains of man and apes by T.H. Huxley at pp. 199-206 [...] the twelfth thousand of 1877 has added at the end, pp. 620-624, a supplemental note which is reprinted from Nature of November 2 1876, p. 18. This is the final definitive text, and subsequent one volume issues until the turn of the century [including this] are from stereos of it' (Freeman p. 130).



Second edition, fifth thousand. Darwin's investigation of the adaptive value of climbing plants was originally issued in the Journal and Proceedings of the Linnean Society of London in 1865 and was only published in book form in 1875 in its second edition, which greatly enlarged the original work of 118 pages to 208 pages. Darwin "found that 'climbing' is a result of the process of nutation; the apex of the plant's stem bends to one side while it grows and the plane of the bend itself revolves, clockwise or counterclockwise, so that the apex describes circular sweeping movements. In the hop plant — in hot weather, during daylight hours — it takes a little over two hours for each revolution. If the growing stem hits nothing, it continues to circle; if it hits an object it wraps itself around it by twining. Twining thus enables a young and feeble plant, in one season, to raise its growing point and leaves much higher from the ground, with more exposure to sunlight and air, without expending time and energy in the synthesis of woody supporting tissues. There is a further delicate adaptation here; a twining plant will not twine around an object larger than approximately six inches in diameter. This adaptation prevents it from climbing up a large tree, where it would be deprived of air and sun by the tree's own leaves" (DSB III, p. 575). Darwin continued these researches further after publication through his investigations into the mechanics of the bending of a plant's stem, which were published in The Power of Movement in Plants in 1880.


Third edition. Price (1873-1960) was a Seventh Day Adventist creationist and self-taught geologist who reinvented flood geology and disputed the existence of different geological strata. A posthumous biography of Romanes (1848–1894), composed of extensive extracts from his correspondence connected by biographical passages written by his wife, the writer and historian Ethel Romanes. George Romanes first met Darwin in 1874, and the two men quickly became close scientific collaborators, enjoying a "a personal friendship that remained close until [Darwin's] death [...] Romanes proved to be one of the most brilliant of the second generation of British Darwinists. Freed from professional obligations by family wealth, uninterested in politics, and endowed with tremendous energy and enthusiasm, he was able to put all his resources at the disposal of science. A clear and forceful writer, he was a prolific contributor not only to scientific journals but also to the monthly reviews that then helped to shape educated opinion" (DSB XI, p. 517). Darwinism was also promoted through the eponymous lectures at Oxford which Romanes endowed in 1891: the second was T.H. Huxley's "Evolution and Ethics" and the third was the neo-Darwinist August Weismann's "The Effect of External Influences upon Development". The Life and Letters is notable for the long series of letters to and from Charles Darwin and, later, Francis Darwin, and the correspondence with other scientists in the field of evolution, including George Henslow and Weismann. The first edition is rare on the market.






First and only edition. Modern Power Generators describes and illustrates a wide range of generators (powered by a variety of fuels), and their application in cars, railway locomotives, etc. The remarkable composite sectional models are composed of an intricate arrangement of colour-printed overlays, which lift to reveal the construction of the engines illustrated in very precise detail. Due to the complexity and fragility of the models, they are often lacking components; in this set the models are in excellent condition and appear (as far as can be ascertained) to be complete. The binding is a fine example of the designs produced for the Gresham Publishing Company by Talwin Morris (1865-1911). Following a period working as the sub-editor and designer of the periodical Black and White, Morris moved to Glasgow in 1893, to become Art Director of the publishers Blackie and Sons, and was heavily influenced by the "Glasgow Style". From 1898 Morris worked with the Gresham Publishing Company, and the present set is typical of his later geometrical art nouveau designs.

Unique collection of ephemera relating to the parade in honour of the first lunar landing in New York on 13th August 1969, collected by on the day by a reveller, contained in a custom-made black solander box $(42 \times 32 \text{ cm})$. These artefacts capture the excitement of one of the most symbolically important moments in American history, when a nation came together to celebrate not only an enormous human achievement, but also a political coup for the US that asserted its superiority over the USSR and temporarily overshadowed the war in Vietnam.

The New York Apollo 11 ticker tape parade was a huge occasion, beginning a whole day of natioanl celebrations. A motorcade carried the three astronauts through Manhattan in front of excited throngs of well-wishers. The astronauts were then flown to Chicago, and then to Los Angeles where, on the same night, they were presented with the Presidential Medal of Freedom by Richard Nixon at a state banquet. It must have been scarcely less exhausting than flying to the Moon.

The collection includes:

- 1) Five newspapers—the New York Post (8.13.69), the New York Daily News (7.21.69 and 8.14.69), and The New York Times (7.21.69 and 8.14.69), celebrating both the landing as well as the parade.
- 2) A bag of actual ticker tape and confetti picked up off of the street
- 3) A paper "No Parking Wednesday Parade" sign
- 4) An inter-office memo, dated 8.13.69, from some firm presumably along the parade route giving permission to its employees to watch: "Subject to the needs of operating the business today, Department Heads may excuse, for a reasonable period, employees who wish to brave the crowds and attempt to see the astronauts."







During a period which saw great debate about the teaching of science and creationism culminating in the high-profile Scopes trial - Millikan was also a spokesperson for the reconciliation of science and religion. The work that won him the Nobel prize in 1923 was crucial to the ratification of theories postulated by Einstein and Bohr, and provided conclusive proof of the particulate nature of electrons and atoms.











He is best known in scientific circles for his work with Ernest Rutherford on the wavelengths of gamma rays, proving that they were shorter and higher in energy than X-rays. He was also a popular broadcaster, becomign famous for his role on BBC Radio's *The Brains Trust* during the 1940s.

Second French edition. The work was first published in 1693 in Paris with a second edition published in Amsterdam in 1696; this edition follows the Dutch version. This is the first French work on the divining rod, detailing how can help in the discovery of water, mines, treasure chests, thieves and murderers on the run. It is illustrated with some attractive engravings of divining techniques as well as scientific instruments and astrological charts. The author, better known as the Abbé de Vallemont (1649-1721), was a serious physicist who wrote works on magnetism and Copernican astronomy. While the science behind dowsing is, at best, questionable, Vallemont does display a rather modern conception of particles, contending that 'atoms' rose from subterranean water, hidden treasures and people that were so small that they were unaffected by wind and could be detected at some distance.

First US edition, originally published in Britain in 1814. A classic of meteorology, for which Wells was awarded the Rumford Medal of the Royal Society. "It would take too much space to follow all of Wells' ingenious experiments, but his conclusions can be stated. The cooling of the Earth's surface, and of the bodies that accumulate dew, is the result of radiation to space. This radiation is always going on, but can be largely interrupted by clouds; and in the daytime it is overbalanced by the radiation to the Earth from the Sun" (Middleton). It is clear that Wells had hit upon what is now called the "greenhouse effect." Moreover, it was of "major importance in the development of the science of ventilation, particularly in its relation to relative humidity and the influence of the latter on the comfort of the occupants of factories, ships, theatres, etc". (Garrison-Morton 1604).



The present work collects articles published mostly in "Land and Water", usually humorously written anecdotes, including 'Snake with two heads', 'Singing mice' and 'Fight between a scorpion and mouse'. His propensity, shared with his famous father William, for eating as many members of the animal kingdom as possible is reflected in articles such as 'Horse-flesh dinner at the Langham Hotel'.





His *Wanderings* catered to the reading public's taste for adventures with its descriptions of a fight with a boa constrictor and the capture of crocodiles. A classic of the literature, Waterton's account was much published throught the 19th century.




