First edition. This is a memorial volume for Abbot, who died on Mount Lefroy in August 1896. The booklet prints Charles E. Fay's account of Abbot's final climb, a biographical note about Abbot by George Herbert Palmer, and then reprints three of Abbot's articles ('The First Ascent of Mount Hector', 'An Ascent of the Weisshorn', and 'Three Days on the Zinal Grat').

First reprint of this self-portrait of the Indonesian statesman, orator, revolutionary, and nationalist who was the first president of Indonesia.

Very rare first edition in English celebrating 'the fourth centennial of the death of the great admiral and scholar'. Written by the 'mother' of modern historiography in Turkey, the historian and sociologist Ayse Afet Inan (1908-85, an adopted daughter of Kemal Atatürk) assesses one of the oldest maps of America still existing. It had been drawn in 1513, and was discovered in 1929 at the Topkapi Palace in Istanbul, were it is still kept. This maps shows extent of exploration of the New World by approximately 1510, and one of the sources used for the compilation might have been a now lost map used by Columbus.

COPAC records only four copies, in the BL, at Oxford, in Leeds and Bristol.

Very rare first Punjabi-English edition of this children's book, the only book by the South African-American intellectual, missionary and teacher James Emman Kwegyir Aggrey (1875-1927). Campaigning for coeducation in Ghana he once said 'The surest way to keep people down is to educate the men and neglect the women. If you educate a man you simply educate an individual, but if you educate a woman, you educate a whole nation'. The book had been published first in German in 1985 with these illustrations.

Over thirty tombs of the nobles of Awan were uncovered by a digging campaign under her leadership. In this history of Egypt from the earliest (then known) dynasties right to the beginning of the 20th century, with interesting chapters on Islam and Christianity in modern Egypt.

First separate edition of Napoleon's letters to his treasurer, number 132 of a total print run of 500. The Cuban sugar trader and financier Julio Lobo y Olavarria (1898-1983) built the largest collection of Napoleonic memorabilia outside France.

The photographs showcase some of the scenery of the region in Canada, as Benjamin 'takes us on an all enchanting and inspiring walk through one of the most beautiful regions of the continental United States.' (front flap)

This is the Swedish edition documenting running, tennis, rowing and a few other athletic disciplines at the Antwerp Summer Olympics of 1920. These were the first Olympic Games after the First World War (after the 1916 Olympics in Berlin had to be cancelled).

First edition. Rodriguez Island is situated in the Indian Ocean some 365 miles E.N.E. of Mauritius, of which it is a dependency. The author spent three years on Rodriguez during the Great War and wrote the present work to bring to the attention of Europeans "this beautiful spot."

First edition, third printing, of the war diary by a German soldier. Cyril Falls considered this book to be 'among the most vivid of German documents relating to the War'. Binding writes in the preface 'These sketches resist any effort to work them up, to collate or elaborate them. In recognition of their documentary value and to conserve their spontaneity, they have not been altered from the form in which they were originally written during the War' (p. 90).

First edition [?]. A Canadian pilot of the Royal Flying Corps tells of his airwar. These first-hand accounts are rather rare. William Avery Bishop (1894-1956) was a flying ace, whose combat flights began on the 22nd of March 1917 near Arras, when the life expectancy of a fighter pilot was eleven days. Soon he was leading his pilots into battle over hostile territory. After one particular patrol 210 bullet holes were counted in his aircraft. - He wrote this book whilst assigned to the British War Mission in Washington, D.C. Therfore we are not sure whether the British or the American printing of this book is earlier. A very readable non-fiction work to accompany Derek Robinson's *Goshawk Squad*.

Blackmer was a retired American banker living in Athens. He collected books on Greece and the Near East, building up an unparalleled collection with the help of leading London and Paris booksellers.

The story of the development and changes in Royal Air Force camouflage and markings over the years 1937-1969, a period which saw massive expansion of the RAF, the momentous years of war, and a long uneasy peace punctuated by the smaller conflicts and tensions of the Cold War.

Posthumously published first edition in the original solemn commemorative binding (as opposed to the other books by Lady Brassy, which all appeared in pictorial cloth). The final voyage of Lady Brassey and the *Sunbeam*, undertaken for the sake of her health. She died and was buried at sea on 14th September 1887. The present work was compiled from her journals by M.A. Broome and covers her journey from India to Labuan, Brunei, Borneo and the Celebes, on to Australia (which the *Sunbeam* circumnavigated) and then home following her death off the north-west coast of Australia. The first 200 pages cover India with Sri Lanka and the onward journey to the Phillipines. The following (roughly) 200 are on Australia, which the *Sunbeam* circumnavigated. This makes this work a major Australianum.

'The cruises of the Sunbeam may have resembled family picnics rather than voyages of discovery, but Annie Brassey, who inspired and organized them, is not to be denied the status of a true traveller. A poor sailor, never really well at sea, she dared all it could do to her, in order that she might visit the farthest corners of the earth. As her husband wrote, "the voyage would not have been undertaken and assuredly it would never have been completed without the impulse derived from her perseverance and determination" [Brassey, *A voyage in the Sunbeam* preface]' (*ODNB*).

The book recounts the author's adventures growing up in the splendid isolation of Tierra del Fuego in the late 19th century. His experience of settling among the native Ona tribe as a young man at the turn of the century are among the highlights of this delightful autobiography.

Provenance: The New Zealand-born mountaineer George Lowe was a member of the 1953 British Mount Everest Expedition led by John Hunt. Between 1955 and 1958 Lowe joined the Commonwealth Trans-Antarctic Expedition which mamaged to cross the continent, and was the first expedition to reach the Soth Pole since Amundsen. George Lowe inscribed the half-tittle above his Trans-Antarctic Expedition bookplate 'My Copy signed by the Author - in Chile 1965. George Lowe'.

A fascinating pamphlet, which reprints a series of letters written by the distinguished Buffalo schoolmaster Horace Briggs, Ph.D. in the course of his 1888 trip to Alaska and the Pacific Northwest, with much on the geology of the areas visited and the American Indians and their customs; Dora Briggs North's preface states that, 'Most of the letters embraced in this pamphlet, describing the places on the Pacific coast visited by my father, have already appeared in the Commercial Advertiser of this City. They are re-published in this form, with some additions and changes, in the belief that they will contribute something to the general knowledge of a very interesting portion of our vast domain' (p. [5]). The pamphlet is scarce, particularly in the original wrappers in such good condition as this; in the UK, COPAC only locates copies in Cambridge and the National Library of Scotland.

First edition. In his preface, the experienced author makes a plea for a halt to indiscriminate and random shooting by amateurs, advising them: 'Read all you can about the animals you intend to hunt. Learn their habits and characteristics and, above all, where to aim in order to reach a vital spot.' He goes on in a radical conservationist fashion: 'A good photograph of a wild animal in its natural surroundings is of more interest than all the heads, and is often a sign of great patience, courage and skill in bushcraft ... Above all, don't kill just for the sake of killing!'

Parts of the book were first published in a 'series of multigraphed leaflets entitled *Trees and Timbers of Sarawak and Brunei*' (Preface). With Browne's own descriptions and observations of the forest wealth of the area, and as an introduction to trees which he encountered. A rare and early work on forest management and preservation on the Malay peninsular.

Ever the dissenter and disruptor Burton writes in the preface: 'A visit after Arab Meccah to Anglo-Indian Aden, with its"political" chaplain and its "priests after the order of Melchisedek." suggested to me that the Moslem may be more tolerant, more enlightened, more charitable, than many societies of the so-called Christians' (vol. I, p. xvii).

For the first time books containing large numbers of colour plates - up to 100 per volume - were made available to the public at an affordable price.' (Inman)

The author's aim was 'to describe the great natural features of the land, in its broader characteristics - its coasts, rivers, mountains, lakes and prairies, those physical beauties and sublime effects of naturs for which the region is specially famous. With this he has attempted to depict the seasons, and the beauty of the Canadian woods. In addition there is given a brief sketch of the settlement and development of the different communities, with special reference to the great centres of provincial and racial activities, and a reference to the people, its origins, composite ideals, and the leading actors on its historical stage of progress and accomplishment' (p. ix). The author William Wilfred Campbell (1860 - 1918) is known as unofficial poet laureate of Canada. Later editions, all dated 1907, come in red cloth and with the top edges not gilt. - This is the best copy of this title we ever handled.

Puebla was founded in 1531 and the most prolific pottery of the Spanish Empire were soon to flourish.

First edition. This book celebrates and describes cheap steamer travel offered by Inman's line for emigrants to North America. The book is dedicated by Captain Chapman, to William Inman, who 'was the first to send the poor emigrant across the Atlantic at a cheap rate by a steamer; and also the first to send steamers to Ireland to take on board poor passengers' (p. iii). The shipowner William Inman (1825-1881) was the first to provide steam navigation for passengers across the Atlantic. 'The Inman Line probably reached its peak in 1870 when its eighteen ships carried 44,000 passengers, mostly emigrants, to New York. The 1870s brought further competition, especially from the White Star Line, and Inman was forced to spend large sums on new ships. His 5500 ton City of Berlin of 1875 was the largest merchant ship in the world after Brunel's Great Eastern, but cost £200,000 at a time when passenger traffic had slumped. In the hope of raising more capital, a new public company, the Inman Steamship Company, was set up in 1875, but conditions were still difficult at the time of Inman's death' (ODNB). A good deal of the book, after a detailed description of the passage to the US, describes wandering about in New England and New York.

COPC locates only two copies, at University of Manchester and in the British Library.

The first half follows the narrator on his travels through wild Australia, the second is dedicated to Chatwin's musings on the nature of man. The book itself is controversial, with some calling it colonialist, simplistic or factually unreliable. Today, however, we accept a similar standard of writing from our politicians and journalists, which renders the criticism fairly moot.

With writings of accidents and avalanches, magic and mystery, these stories are for children and grown-ups, ski racers and armchair athletes. Proceeds from the book will go to Snow Camp, the UK's National Snowsports charity, giving young inner-city children the opportunity to experience the mountains and in many cases turn their lives around.

First US edition. The daughter of the well-known traveller Charles Adolphus Murray, Earl of Dunmore (1841-1907) and a relative of the adventuress and traveller Jane Digby (1807-1881), Lady Evelyn Cobbold (1867-1963) developed an interest in both travel and Islam 'during a childhood punctuated by winters in Algeria and Egypt, where she accompanied her father on sorties into the desert. In Algeria she learnt to speak Arabic and delighted in escaping her governess to visit local mosques with her Algerian friends. She later considered that, "unconsciously I was a little Moslem at heart" (ODNB). Wayfarers in the Libyan Desert was her first work, and is a journal of her travels through Libya in 1911 with her friend Frances Gordon Alexander: the work was jointly written by Lady Evelyn and Alexander, and the English edition was issued under Lady Evelyn's name and the American edition (which contains a slightly different text) was issued under Alexander's name. Before World War I, Lady Evelyn travelled in the Middle East, meeting T.E. Lawrence near Petra in 1914 and again in Egypt in 1915, by which time she had renounced Christianity for Islam and had taken the Muslim name Zainab, and 'Subsequent study of Islam persuaded her that Islam was the religion "most calculated to solve the world's many perplexing problems, and to bring to humanity peace and happiness" (ODNB). In 1933, aged 65, Lady Evelyn became the first British woman to make the hajj (assisted by introductions from Harry St John Bridger Philby), describing the experience in Pilgrimage to Mecca (London: 1934). - This US edition appeared without Lady Cobbold's name on the title-page. Her American travel companion was a New York socialite who had married Allen Gouverneur Wellman in 1910. 'It is very unusual in publishing circles for the same text to be published the same year under the same title by two different authors, but this is what happened in 1912 with Wayfarers in the Libyan Desert' (Cobwebs New & Views, Cobbold Family History Trust, online).

The date of the event was changed by hand to February 27th, and on the verso is the purchaser's name the *Most Noble Marquis of Stafford*. On the front is the secretary Daniel Egerton's signature and the number of the ticket (139) in ink. The allegorical engraving - a little reminiscent of William Blake - is by Charles Corbould. The fund had been instituted in 1765 'for supporting aged, indigent, and infirm actors and actresses of the Theatre Royal, Covent Garden, and relieving their widows and children'. The fund is now incorporated in the The Royal Theatrical Fund.

Provenance: John Burke da Silva (1918-2003), was a collector of Middle Eastern art, antiques and books, who had served in the British army from 1940-1946, reaching the rank of major, and was mentioned in despatches. After the war he joined the Foreign Service which took him to many parts of the world, including Bahrain in 1960 and later posts in Hamburg, Aden and Washington. - Together with a letter, dated 1994, from the author to Da Silva, discussing Aden affairs of the past, and a draft of a letter, probably by Da Silva discussing Crouch's book and the writer's own experience in the Middle East.

The Ubena region lies in Tanzania just north-east of Lake Nyasa, and the present work offers a history of the Bena rulers and elders of the area, including a chapter by Chief Towegale Kiwanga. 'This book was prompted by the eagerness of the Chief Towegale Kiwanga, and many of the Bena royal clan and elders, to have a permanent record of tribal history and custom. Mr. and Mrs Culwick have lived among them for some years, and have the complete confidence of the tribe together with a thorough knowledge of the language and the same training in scientific investigation. The result is a well-balanced picture of the life and outlook of a typical East African Bantu tribe in a period of transition, in which the mythical "dead cake of custom" stands revealed as a living thing, capable of growth and development' (dustwrapper blurb).

Curzon's *Tales* include details of his residences in North Africa, Japan, Central Africa, Central Asia, Tunisia, Afghanistan (much on the Middle East including Kuwait, a fine plate depicting the *Body-guard of the Sheikh of Koweit* facing p. 250), and travels in the Gobi Desert. The short chapter on Kuwait reports of Curzon's state visit as Viceroy of India in 1903. To honour the visitor the Sheiks had ordered a carriage from India, proabaly the first time such a carriage had been seen in Kuwait. While the Sheik and Curzon held their diplomatic talks at the palace the Arab horses shredded the vehicle to matchsticks, as these horses were not accustomed to be harnessd to carriages.

Darling began his journey in Peshawar and ended, 1,400 miles futher south, in Jubbulpore where he paid a visit to his friend Mahatma Gandhi. The author had been a member of the Indian Civil Service and gathered the mood and opinions of the population on the impeding social and political change. He had been considered as some sort of a maverick, as he sought to improve the life of the rural Subjects of the British Empire.

Day analyzes the complex situation on the Balkans during the Great War, with Serbia's collapse, the Young Turk movement, and the ethnic mix whipped up by nationalism on all sides. Particularly fascinating is the description of life in Thessaloniki, which had a large Ladino population of about 100,000, and commonly used phrases in the crowded streets and bazaars sometimes composed of more than two different laguages, such as Turkish and Greek.

First edition, one of 150 copies, of Conan Doyle's log, recording his experiences as a young ship's surgeon aboard the Arctic whaler SS *Hope* on its voyage of 28 February to 11 August 1880. Whilst Arthur Conan Doyle

was a twenty-year old medical student at Edinburgh University, one of his fellow-students called Currie enlisted to serve as the surgeon on a whaling cruise to the Arctic. However, a last-minute change forced Currie to withdraw and find a replacement - and Doyle took up his position.

The Hope sailed from Peterhead and soon made its way to the Arctic, where Doyle assisted with the whaling as well as undertaking the surgeon's duties, although his lack of experience on the ice led to a number of accidents when he fell through thin sheets into the freezing sea and earned him the nickname 'The Great Northern Diver'. The experiences of the cruise remained with Doyle to the end of his life - indeed, the harsh life of the whalers provides a backdrop to some of the Sherlock Holmes stories, such as 'Black Peter' - and he would later recollect in his Memories and Adventures that, 'I went on board the whaler a big, straggling youth, I came off it a powerful, well-grown man' (Ware, Hertfordshire: 2007, p. 37). Doyle's two-volume manuscript log of the voyage remained in his family's possession, and it is reproduced in a finely-printed colour facsimile here, followed by an annotated transcription, and four pieces by Conan Doyle inspired by his Arctic experiences: 'The Glamour of the Arctic', 'Life on a Greenland Whaler', 'The Captain of the "Pole-Star" and 'The Adventure of Black Peter'.

The author was endowed with a penetrating observation and a felicitous style. He arrived in the United States in June, 1864, during a critical period of the war, and remained until February, 1865, when the victory of the North was certain. During that time he travelled extensively: from Quebec to Georgia and from Boston to Missouri. Among his many interesting pages will be found valuable materials on Boston, Philadelphia, New York, Washington, Chicago, Missouri, and Kentucky' (Monaghan 623). Duvergier de Hauranne was a travel writer, journalist and moved in circles that supported the House of Orléans.

He also provides an excellent chapter on the habits of tigers with numerous shooting experiences' (see Czech p. 68 for the first issue without maps).

This is his first-hand account of life on the lower deck, hard labour and class division at high seas during a war. However, 'he liked the service so much that he spent twelve peacetime years as a Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve rating, and considered his naval experiences one of the major cultural influences of his life' (ODNB).

Scarce first edition. 'The lands beyond the Jordan are seldom visited. For the ordinary sight-seer the difficulties and dangers are considerable; but these almost entirely vanish before one who can speak the language and is able to mingle freely with the people. This book is an attempt to lift a little way the veil which still so largely obscures that region, in spite of its great and splendid history; where picturesque and beautiful scenery, the crumbling memorials of grey antiquity, and the life of villager and nomad to-day, cast a mysterious spell upon the spirit. While the information given in the following pages is woven round the narrative of a single journey, it is the outcome of frequent travel and familiar intercourse with the peoples both east and west of Jordan' (Foreword). The author was a missionary of the Free Church of Scotland in Palestine; the photos were provided by other Scots residing in the Levant.

First edition, and not the issue in collaboration with the Book Society. Patrick Leigh Fermor had originally conceived a one-volume work about Greece, but his publisher Jock Murray persuaded him that it should be divided into two volumes, and that the first should cover the southern Peloponnese (Murray was doubtless also concerned that this would be the only way to get the book out of Fermor, who was not only an inveterate rewriter but particularly susceptible to distraction). After some four years of work on *Mani*, Fermor finished correcting the proofs in the summer of 1958, and the book was published at the end of the year, when its 'difficult gestation was rewarded with enthusiastic reviews. The *Times Literary Supplement* recognised the author as a "literary trailblazer" in a region of Greece that few people knew anything about. And as *Mani* was promoted as the first of a series of books on Greece, the *Times* reviewer wrote that "Mr Leigh Fermor will be hard-put to keep up his own level in the sequels" (A. Cooper *Patrick Leigh Fermor. An Adventure* (London: 2012), p. 307). This critical approval translated into commercial success, and *Mani* was the Book Society choice for December 1958 and it went on to win the first Duff Cooper Memorial Prize. *Roumeli*, the complementary sequel, was published in 1966.

First trade edition. A collection of three pieces on monasteries and monasticism: 'The Abbey of St Wandrille de Fontanelle', 'From Solesmes to La Grande Trappe', 'The Rock Monasteries of Cappadocia', followed by a 'Postscript' which considers the history of the English Benedictine Congregation and its peregrinations through Europe, and Byzantine monasticism. First published in The Cornhill in 1949 under the title 'A Monastery', the first and longest piece collected here is Patrick Leigh Fermor's account of his residence at l'Abbaye de St Wandrille de Fontanelle in north-west France, which recounts the history of the Benedictine abbey founded in 649 by St Wandrille and provides a typically erudite assessment of the role of monasticism in European intellectual life, together with his own personal reaction to the spiritual discipline and structure of monastic life under the Rule of St Benedict: 'Worship, then, and prayer are the raison d'être of the Benedictine order; and anything else, even their great achievements as scholars and architects and doctors of the church, is subsidiary. They were, however, for centuries the only guardians of literature, the classics, scholarship and the humanities in a world of which the confusion can best be compared to our own atomic era. For a long period, after

the great epoch of Benedictine scholarship at Cluny, the Maurist Benedictine Abbey of St. Germain-des-Près was the most important residuary of learning and science in Europe - only a few ivy-clad ruins remain, just visible between *zazou* suits and existentialist haircuts from the terrace of the Deux Magots. But in scores of abbeys all over Europe, the same liberal traditions survive and prosper. Other by-products of their life were the beautiful buildings in which I was living, and the unparalleled calm that prevailed there. At St Wandrille I was inhabiting at last a tower of solid ivory, and I, not the monks, was the escapist. For my hosts, the Abbey was a springboard into eternity; for me a retiring place to write a book and spring more effectively back into the maelstrom. Strange that the same habitat should prove favourable to ambitions so glaringly opposed' (pp. 34-35). The second and third pieces were written later and describe Trappist and Byzantine monasticism, and the three pieces were first published together in 1953 in a limited edition issued by the Queen Anne Press. The text was then revised by the author for publication in this first trade edition, issued by John Murray in May 1957.

As Artemis Cooper comments in *Patrick Leigh Fermor: An Adventure* (London: 2012), 'Almost none of his subsequent writings show anything like the same level of introspection, and certain passages seem to yearn for a deeper spiritual experience, like a thirsty man in the desert gazing at at what might be an oasis or a mirage. For the monks the oasis was very real but for Paddy, in spite of his yearnings, it remained a mirage. Yet the weeks he spent in these French monasteries had made a profound impression' (p. 235).

Very rare first edition. George Finlay (1799-1875) was a British historian. His interest in the Greek struggle for independence took him to Cephalonia in 1823, where he was received by Lord Byron. He established himself in Athens, and undertook several trips to the Levant, of which this book is a product. 'The topographical opinions announced in this Essay are the result of a careful examination of the localities in the month of March [1846]' (p. 6).

Provenance: Alexander Bennett McGrigor of Cairnoch (1827-1891) was a lawyer, co-owner of a big Glasgow law firm and book collector.

Truman to establish a temporary, five-man commission that inquired into all phases of aviation and drafted the national air policy report. This commission was known as 'The Finletter Commission'. Finletter served as chairman of the Air Policy Commission which, on January 1, 1948, sent to the president the report entitled *Survival in the Air Age*; it was actually released on January 13, the 3 being supplied by hand in the space the printer left after the *I* in the date of the imprint.

Eleventh printing in the very rare dust-wrapper. Peter Fleming's first book. 'In April 1932 Fleming answered an advertisement in the agony column of The Times, which led him to take part in a crack-brained and amateurish expedition to the hinterland of Brazil, ostensibly to look for Colonel P.H. Fawcett, a missing explorer. Fleming persuaded The Times to appoint him their unpaid special correspondent. This mixture of farce, excitement, discomfort, and danger achieved nothing except to provide him with the subject matter for his first book, Brazilian Adventure, published in August 1933. In it he blew sky-high the excessive reverence and solemnity with which travel books had hitherto been treated, mocking the dangers and himself with infectious humour. People could not believe that a story of true adventure could be so funny, and the book had immense success at home and in America' (ODNB). - Despite the run-away success of the book all early printings have become exceedingly rare.

First US edition (first published in London, 1872) of this account of a Middle Eastern journey undertaken out of curiosity by an American politician, adventurer, traveller and writer. Fogg perambulated quite some time through modern Iraq, visiting Basrah, where he notes the exports from the region, visits Assyrian remains, describes life in Baghdad, and visits Karbala. This long section takes up over 130 pages. Apart from the places mentioned on the title-page, Fogg visited Muscat and both sides of the Strait of Hormuz, reporting on the pearl fisheries along the Trucial Coast. As an American, Fogg's outlook was not Colonial or Imperial in any way, which makes this a valuable supplement to the mostly British and French reports on the region.

'She met leading personalities in Cairo, Damascus, Beirut, and elsewhere, and laid the foundation of her lifelong interest in Arab affairs. She also planned the adventure on which rests her claim to be taken seriously as an explorer: her journey in the winter of 1920-21 across the Libyan desert to the oasis of Kufra, which lay beyond the frontiers of Italian occupation and within the territory of Sayed Idris al-Senussi (later King Idris of Libya) ... Rosita Forbes disguised herself as a Muslim, taking the name of Khadija and inventing a Circassian mother to account for imperfections in her Arabic. She had introductions to the Italian authorities. who tried to prevent her moving outside the zone they controlled, and to the sheikhs of the Senussi. She had, too, the good fortune to travel with Ahmad Hassanein Bey, the Egyptian scholar and explorer. Their journey by camel across the desert to the oasis, reached on 15 January 1921, was arduous and at times difficult, the return through Egypt by the Siwa oasis hardly less so, and Hassanein Bey's knowledge of the terrain and personalities concerned was vital to the success of the venture' (ODNB).

The journey began at Asmara, led south via Axum and Gondar, then to Lalibela and along the Blue Nile to Addis Ababa and Harar.

Very rare first edition. Archibald Forder (1863-1934) had been a missionary in the Levant for 13 years, 'with the Ishmaelites of Moab, Edom and Arabia' as he says on the title-page. Unlike most other books by missionaries he is almost exclusively concerned with details of the material culture, from crafts and technology to food and agriculture. 'Forder had a deep affection for Arab peoples, especially the Bedouin tribes among whom he itinerated widely' (Missiology Blog). This is a narrative of Forder's journey from Moab into the desert and Northern Arabia via Druze country and Bashan, with some spectacular pictorial material of everyday life.

An account of social life and customs in Turkey in the 19th century, given by Melek Hanim, the wife of Kibrisli Mehemet-Pacha, after his death in 1871. Her memoirs provide an account of her time in the harem, and of the high spheres of Ottoman society that surrounded this institution at that time. Her biography was first published in London in 1872. 'Melek Hanum (Hanim) ... met Kibrisli Mehement (Mehmed) Pasha, in Paris, and they were married upon returning to Istanbul. She accompanied him to various postings in Palestine and Serbia, and shared with him the frustrations of the arbitrary periodic dismissals that characterized late Ottoman politics. Her sensationalist account of life in Turkey contains details of political intrigue and corruption, and demonstrates the influence and mobility available to women in the official households of the Ottoman elite. During Mehmed Pasha's absence, Melek Hanim concocted a plan to replace her sickly son with another child in the event of his expected death. Although her own son survived, one of her coconspirators killed another, and the ensuing scandal resulted in her divorce. She spent the rest of her life trying to exact vengeance upon her ex-husband and attempting to gain access to property she viewed as legitimately her own. After several setbacks, she and two of her children finally fled to Paris. Thirty Years in the Harem, was written during her impoverished exile there, and is highly critical of Islam and of Ottoman society' (ebook edition advertisement text, online).

An ex-library copy, numbered '353,' from 'Cercle des Phocéens,' or, the Marseilles Circle, founded in 1787. This group was founded by local noteables, who wished to propose new ideas outside of religion and politics, and who were interested in ideas of the development of the city.

He dutifully fought in the ranks of the Kaiser's armies during 1914 and 1915 and saw action in France and Belgium where he describes the terrible events which were to become known as 'the rape of Belgium' and also details the extent of the fighting including being forced to form part of a firing squad, crossing the Meuse under heavy fire, using corpses as road building materials annihilating a cavalry charge hand to hand bayonet fighting, and the awful events of the disastrous German retreat from the Marne. With the onset of trench warfare Koettgen also experienced the horrors of trench warfare and the famous Christmas truce of 1914. In 1915 he decided that enough was enough and escaped military life by deserting the colors and slipping through the lines to neutral Holland. His memoirs were published by a gleeful allied press under the title A German Deserter's War Experience' (from a modern edition).

The merit of Lyall's literary work was recognized throughout Europe and honorary degrees were conferred upon him by the universities of Oxford, Edinburgh, and Strasbourg. He was elected a fellow of the British Academy and King's College, London, and a vice-president of the Royal Asiatic Society, of which he was a prominent member. He helped found the London School of Oriental Studies and represented the government of India at oriental congresses in Rome (1899), Hamburg (1902), Algiers (1905), and Copenhagen (1908)' (ODNB).

'Little has hitherto been done to make the poetry of Ancient Arabia known to the English reader, and that which has been attempted has followed other methods than those adopted in this collection. In it my endeavour has been, so far as my powers permitted, to render line for line and measure for measure, and to afford in acommentary all the explanation which seemed needful to the understanding of the text' (p. vii).

The book had been published first by William and Norgate in 1885 with the same collation. This edition is an anastatic reprint.

This book deals mainly with how the French mandate authorities dealt with nationalist movements and uprisings in modern Syria and their policies in Lebanon and Syria after the Sykes-Picot agreement. Of course the ethnic and religious divisions are dealt with in detail.

Originally produced in 1964 by the People's Liberation Army - an early version was titled 200 Quotations from Chairman Mao - it soon became a key feature of the leader's personality cult. The Ministry of Culture aimed to distribute a copy to every Chinese citizen and hundreds of new printing houses were built in order to achieve this. Mao himself reportedly liked its resemblance to books of quotations by philosophers such as Confucius' (BBC News Magazine, online).

He subsequently returned to mainland Europe to serve in the French army before settling in Egypt in the 1920s. After the outbreak of the Second World War Peniakoff was commissioned into the British army, leading the No. 1 Demolition Squadron as part of the Libyan Arab Force. Commonly known as Popski's Private Army, it was purportedly the smallest independent unit in the British army, containing just 120 soldiers. This book, published a year before his death, provides the author's personal account of that campaign.

William "Bill" Pinkney is the first African American, and only the fourth person in the world to circumnavigate the globe alone by boat. Pinkney was born on September 15, 1935, in Chicago, Illinois to Marion Henderson Pinkney and William Pinkney, Sr. He attended Tilden Tech High School in Chicago, and after graduating received training as an x-ray technician.

After high school Pinkney had a variety of different jobs. He was on active duty in the Navy from 1956 to 1960 as a hospital corpsman. He decided to move to Puerto Rico after leaving the Navy and while there held a series of jobs including one as a professional limbo dancer. Eventually he was hired to work as a crewman on sailboats. Pinkney then moved to New York, trained to become a make-up artist and eventually landed a job at Revlon, the cosmetics company. From there he moved back to his hometown of Chicago to work for the Johnson and Johnson Company. By 1980, however, Pinkney was an employee of the city of Chicago.

Despite the variety of jobs, Pinkney continued his interest in sailing that he had developed in Puerto Rico and became particularly adept at sailing alone. At the age of 50, after thinking about the legacy he would leave behind for his two grandchildren, April and Brian Walton, Pinkney decided he would attempt to sail around the world alone to encourage them to think and do the impossible. After receiving funding from the industrialist Armand Hammer and a Boston law firm, Aldrich, Eastman, and Waltch, he began to plan his solo voyage.

At the age of 55 Pinkney began his odyssey on August 5, 1990, setting sail from Boston Harbor. He sailed on a 47foot boat called The Commitment, which had been specially rigged so one man could operate it. Out of all the possible routes, Pinkney chose the most difficult one, which would take him around the five capes. He made stops in Bermuda, Brazil, South Africa, Tasmania, and finally around Cape Horn (the most difficult part of the voyage). His voyage took him 22 months, including a six month delay in Australia due to weather, and covered 27,000 miles.

After successfully completing the voyage, Pinkney worked for a time as a motivational speaker. Then in 1999 he completed another journey following the infamous "Middle Passage" of 17th and 18th century slave ships backwards from Puerto Rico to Brazil and finally to Ghana and Senegal in West Africa. In 2000 Pinkney was asked to be the first captain of the replica of the Schooner La Amistad which was made famous in 1839 because of the slaves on board who were eventually freed by a U.S. Supreme Court decision.

Pinkney has received numerous awards, honorary degrees and recognitions including the 1992 Yachtsman of the Year Award from the Chicago Yacht Club. He continues to work as a motivational speaker for public schools and corporations' (blackpast.org, online).

Provenance: Loosely inserted a calligraphic letter with envelope by William Pinkney on his blind-stamped stationery to Nancy Mack announcing futher sailing trips to the west coast of Africa, dated November 2007. Prospectus for the trade edition of the book loosely inserted.

This very limited edition was not destined for the trade. It was presented to family, friends, the many supporters who enabled the circumnavigation and a few journalists. Even the trade edition has become very uncommon.

The present work is a rare survival, as the American novelist's work was published in a series of affordable books, mass-produced and not destined to survive for long.

'In 1907 a people's movement to Christ among the Flowery Miao, a minority nationality reached the Chaotung area from its starting point in Anshun, Kweichow (Guizhou) Province, and Pollard became its most famed missionary leader. Until his death from typhoid, he established a center for the thousands of new believers in Shimenkan across the Kweichow provincial border, itinerated widely, planted churches, trained leaders, obtained justice for Miao Christians from officials and landlords, developed a unique script, known as the Pollard script, and used it when he translated the New Testament into the Miao language. He is remembered by Miao Christians as their spiritual ancestor' (Biographical Dictionary of Christian Missions). The Pollard script, loosely based on the Western letter alphabet is still in use.

Jawaharlal Nehru wrote in the foreword, the 'there are two kinds of books on India written by Englishmen. The great majority of them are of the imperial and patronising variety which point out to us the high destiny of the British Empire and our folly in not appreciating this patent fact ... The other variety of books, very few in number, are written by Englishmen who are attracted towards our freedom struggle' (pp. xixii). This book clearly falls into the second category.

The ceramic designer Charlotte Rhead had joined A. J. Richardson, the founder of the pottery in 1932. Her designs for Richardson included Byzantine, Foxglove and Wisteria. She descended from an artistic family of potters and was born in 1885 right in the middle of the British centre of potteries, in Burslem, Stoke-on-Trent. The present design, which never went into mass production is rather unusual, as it combines influences from the Wiener Werkstätten (the rectangular frieze with red dots) with traditional Royal insignia. The matt lustre is unusual as well, alongside the angular shape. The present cup is one of her rarest designs for the event that never took place, and most likely one of a few prototypes.

Despite its great popularity the lessons from this book have apparently not been learned.

'Rodway was born in England in 1848, but from 1870 to his death in 1926 lived in British Guiana where he made valuable contributions to the colony's history, literature and culture. Apart from Georgetown and his major work, A History of British Guiana from 1668 To The Present Time which appeared in two parts - Volume One in 1891, and Volume Two in 1893, he produced other writings including studies of Guyana's hinterland in In the Guiana Forest: Studies in Nature in Relation to the Struggle for Life (1894), and the novel In Guiana Wilds: A study of Two Women (1899). Rodway also helped to establish Guvanese cultural institutions such as the Royal Agricultural and Commercial Society of which he was Assistant Secretary from 1886-1888, and the British Guiana Museum of which he was the curator in 1894-1899. In addition, he edited the influential journal Timehri (review by Frank Birbalsingh of re-issue of Rodway's History, online under www.indocaribbeanworld.com/archives/2012). Some chapters deal with ecological issues, such as The Interdependence of Plants and Animals, and Rodway, as many others, was fascinated by the wealth of phenomena found in the tropics: 'It is not merely that there do you find the struggle for existence carried on with a wild energy which none can overlook, both among plants and animals' (introduction).

There was for long much confusion about the heights and identities of these remote Tajik peaks. In 1962 Wilfrid Noyce and the young Scottish climber Robin Smith died in a fall after an ascent of the peak.

Apart from being a very detailed road map of Britian the main interest lies in the company who issued it. 'A released Home Office file (HO 144/17917) deals with concern that R.O.P. Ltd. were engaged in dubious activities circa from July 1932 to August 1933. Officials were concerned that this company was being used as a base for communist political activities leading to espionage and sabotage. Apart from the Home Office severely limiting the large number of applicants to join the board of R.O.P. Ltd., there are files which include profiles of communist activists and employees, both Russian and British, and submissions from surveillance officers and ex-employees. For example, in 1932 Volodarsky, clumsily posing as a Romanian journalist, offered bribes to Shell Mex employees in return for oil industry information. Volodarsky was in fact an OGPU agent, posing in Britain under cover of being employed by Russian Oil Products. At this time Volodarsky was living at 160 Highbury New Park, an address associated at the time with many Soviet agents ... Later, security files also disclose that MI5 kept a close watch on the company which was suspected of being a cover for Soviet espionage during wartime' (http://www.blisworth.org.uk).

The hero of this non-fiction book masquerading as fiction - or the other way round - is about the Sarawk shady adventurer Gerard MacBryan, variously known as Haji Abdul Rahman, David Chale, the "Baron". 'He conjured a plan to establish something like a caliphate uniting the Muslim territories of East Asia under his rule. To this end he converted to Islam, adopted the name Abdul Rahman and, accompanied by his beautiful Malay mistress (and later wife), a one-time prostitute named Sa'erah, made the pilgrimage to Mecca. Out of this came the honorific "Haji" and a book about the trip published under the pseudonym David Chale, though some claimed the whole adventure was a Münchhausen-style fabrication (James Conway, The White Caliph, Strange Flowers, online). - The publisher quotes a short endorsement of the book from TLS, 'a strange book'.

First edition of a scarce title. The personal account of the 40-year old Yorkshire woman, the only British woman to serve as an active soldier in WW1. 'Whatever reservations were expressed about women in the ranks at home, however, Sandes's experience and position demanded the same respect shown to any official representative of an allied army. She had returned home wearing the Kara George star - the highest medal awarded to non-commissioned officers-for her bravery during the Serbian retreat into Albania. She had lived in the trenches with her comrades, shared their food, slept underneath their overcoats, divided her last cigarettes and crusts of bread with them, and was severely wounded in November 1915 by a Bulgarian bomb. Promoted to sergeant she was wounded again in July 1917 and returned to her unit the following October. She participated in the final offensive against the Austrian and Bulgarian forces and was demobilized on 31 October 1922' (ODNB). - Flora Sandes, of Irish descent, was described by the Irish Times as follows: 'Less Flora, more fauna, she rode horses, shot things, and learned to drive fast cars as early as possible' (Frank McNally, A Feminist at the Front - An Irishman's Diary about Flora Sandes, March 2, 2017).

After a long career as Special Operations Office and diplomat, 'he returned [in 1958] to the world of irregular warfare when he was appointed commander of the sultan of Muscat and Oman's armed forces. His success in suppressing the sultan's Saudi-backed enemies was perhaps the pinnacle of his post-war career. With the support of two SAS squadrons and the Royal Air Force, his efforts culminated in the capture of the rebels' mountain base in the Jebel Akhdar in early 1959. When his Oman appointment came to an end in 1961, Smiley was offered command of the SAS but decided instead to leave the army, retiring with the rank of colonel. From 1963 until 1967 he worked for the Saudi government as an adviser to royalist forces struggling in Yemen against a faction backed by Egypt's President Nasser. In 1968 he retired with his wife and family to Alicante province, Spain, where he farmed for the next twenty years, before returning to Britain to settle in Somerset and later in west London (ODNB).

It was originally conceived for the transport of tea from the plantations and on the way up the hills, to get tourists to enjoy the fresh air in combination with a cuppa.

These are two thirds of the Red Wheel Trilogy in first English edition, rarely found together. The first volume is the English translation by Michael Glenny. The novel centres on the disastrous loss in the Battle of Tannenberg (1914) in August, 1914, which resulted in the almost complete destruction of the Russian 2nd Army. November 1916 is the continuation of Solszenitsyn's essayistic examination of further developments in Russian history during the First World War, interspersed with long dialogues. Richard Seltzer on samizdat.com wrote about November 1916 'While technically this book is fiction, the heart of the story is, in fact, meticulously researched and exhaustively presented history. The central figure is a Colonel Vorotyntsev, who also figured prominently in August 1914. Much of the story is seen through his eyes, as he moves from the Eastern Front to Moscow and Petersburg, then to Russian military headquarters in Mogilev. He has his personal ambitions and concerns, his love life, his human weaknesses. But he is driven to understand what is happening to Russia and try to find out if and how he can intervene to save his nation'. This volume is hard to find, particularly with the UK imprint (however the sheets were printed in the USA) to go along with the UK August 1914~i~. The third volume of the trilogy has not been translated into English yet.

First UK edition. This edition is translated from the Russian by Nicholas Bethell and David Burg. After writing a letter criticising Joseph Stalin in 1945, Solzhenitsyn was arrested and exiled to Central Russia. The novel was originally circulated in Russia via *samizdat* ('self-published') literature in 1966, after Solzhenitsyn was denied official publication of his works in 1963, due to the tightening of ideological structures on cultural activity in the Soviet Union. *Cancer Ward* is based on Solzhenitsyn's own hospitalisation and successful treatment of his terminally diagnosed cancer during his forced exile in Kazakhstan in the 1950s. He later went on to win the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1970. (Encyclopaedia Britannica).

"Writing at the beginning of the twentieth century, Charles Squire described his introduction to Celtic mythology as 'the only attempt yet made to put the English reader into possession, in clear, compact, and what it is hoped may prove agreeable form, of the mythical, legendary and poetic traditions of the earliest inhabitants of our islands who have left us written records - the Gaelic and the British Celts". The needs of readers at the beginning of the twenty-first century have not changed much, and a popular introduction to the subject of Celtic mythology is a very desirable resource. In some ways, Squire's book still fulfils the criteria he himself established' (Juliette Wood, Cardiff University, Early Celtic Scholarship and the Romantic Celt: Charles Squire online).

Second UK edition. This is the companion volume to one of the most influential pieces of 19th-century fiction, giving the evidence that the conditions of slavery are as bad as described in the novel. 'Stowe wrote this book to defend her novel against one of the most wide-spread complaints that pro-slavery critics lodged against it that as an account of slavery Uncle Tom's Cabin was wholly false, or at least wildly exaggerated. Thus The Key is organized around that defensive project, taking up her major characters one at a time, for example, to cite real life equivalents to them. At the same time, defending her novel led her to mount a more aggressive attack on slavery in the South than the novel itself had. In the novel she works hard to be sympathetic to white southerners as well as black slaves; here, her prose seems much angrier, both morally and rhetorically more contemptuous. One explanation for this sharper tone could be the novel's reception in the South, where no one seems to have appreciated her attempt to be fair. Stowe was probably unprepared for the South's shrill rejection of the book' (http://utc.iath.virginia.edu/uncletom/key/kyhp.htm). This is the issue with an appendix on pp. 505-508, set in rather small type, documenting the US government's bias and falsification of statistics concerning slavery.

Ironically the first edition sold out on review day and this second edition was hastily arranged by the publishers.

First edition. Thesiger's 'first and - in his opinion - his finest book' (ODNB). Arabian Sands recounts Thesiger's travels with the *Bedu* through the Empty Ouarter between 1945 and 1950: 'The empty quarter or Rub' al-Khali had been crossed by Bertram Thomas in 1931 and by Harry St John Philby in 1932. Understandably Thomas had followed the easiest route. Philby's journey, on the other hand, involved a trek of 400 miles between wells, which Thesiger regarded as an epic of desert exploration. Despite such important journeys, vast areas of the empty quarter still remained unexplored. Thesiger first crossed the empty quarter in 1946-7, a journey of 2000 miles that began and ended at Salala, on Arabia's south coast. In February 1947 he met Salim bin Kabina, a sixteen-yearold Bedu of the Rashid tribe, who, together with Salim bin Ghabaisha, also of the Rashid, became Thesiger's inseparable companion during his years in Arabia. Bin Kabina and bin Ghabaisha accompanied his second crossing of the empty quarter, in 1947-8, and his later journeys, in 1949 and 1950, in Oman' (Alexander Maitland in ODNB).

Provenance: John Burke da Silva (1918-2003) was a collector of Middle Eastern art, antiques and books, who had served in the British army from 1940-1946, reaching the rank of major, and was mentioned in despatches. After the war he joined the Foreign Service which took him to many parts of the world, including Bahrain in 1960 and later posts in Hamburg, Aden and Washington. - Together with a letter, dated 1994, from the author to Da Silva, discussing Aden affairs of the past, and a draft of a letter, probably by Da Silva discussing Crouch's book and the writer's own experience in the Middle East. The inscription translates as *To John and Jane da Silva as a memorial to our trips in Muscat and Oman … whatever makes the mountains of Oman a gateway to paradise … Joe Linch [or Leech], England 1962.*

The work is prefaced by an introduction recounting Thesiger's life and travels and the circumstances in which the photographs were taken, and is divided into four sections: the first is drawn from photographs taken in the course of various travels; the second is of images of Africa; the third of the Arab World; the fourth of Asia (each of the last three is prefaced by its own introduction). 'I have never taken a colour photograph, nor have I ever felt the urge to do so. This may be due in part to my preference for drawings rather than paintings, my appreciation of line rather than colour. I am, however, convinced that black and white photography affords a wider and more interesting scope than colour, which by its very nature aims to reproduce exactly what is seen by the photographer [...] because of its accuracy, colour photography lends itself ideally to animals, birds or ceremonial occasions, for example. With black and white film, on the other hand, each subject offers its own variety of possibilities, according to the use made by the photographer of light and shade. This is particularly the case with portraits, which are my chief interest. Indeed, I believe that the majority of the photographs in this book have a quality that would have been lost in colour' (p. 10). This copy was inscribed by Thesiger to Michael Shaw of Curtis Brown, who succeeded Graham Watson as Thesiger's agent in circa 1980, and represented him through the 1980s and 1990s.

The author makes it clear that he prefers the Ottoman to the Russians. At the beginning of the conflict Wellesley believed the Turks would win. He singles out rampant corruption at all levels as the single most important item undermining the ability of the Russian Army to defeat its enemy' (review of a modern edition by Gilberto Villahermosa).

Etiol)', John Galsworthy ('Holsworthy'), H.G.Wells ('Springs'), Thomas Washington Metcalfe ('Thomas Volstead Wrink') and J.B.Priestley ('P.B. Bradford'). Priestley took offence and remarked 'a great oozing slab of self-pity, bearing the wet trade-mark of Henry Williamson'. Williamson's Tarka had 'attracted the attention of T. E. Lawrence, whose letter of praise started a correspondence and friendship between the two. Indeed, Lawrence's fatal motorcycle crash on 14 May 1935 occurred as he was returning from a trip to the post office to send a telegram to Williamson, who later wrote a memoir of his friendship with Lawrence, Genius of Friendship (ODNB).
